Team SHARE Atlanta Raises Over \$15,000 for The March of Dimes

On Saturday, April 24, the largest SHARE Atlanta team ever joined the March of Dimes WalkAmerica in months bearable for me," says Ivey of her devoted Centennial Olympic Park. While last year's team of fifteen walkers raised \$2400 and broke all previous records, that total paled in comparison to the 2004 numbers. Team Captain, Jennifer Greer, declared this year's walk "the best ever" for SHARE Atlanta, and attributed the increase in support to improved communication and the inspiring participation of Marcia McGinnis, SHARE Atlanta President and Foundress. The other key factor was the dedication of SHARE Atlanta mom, Cindy Ivey, a seasoned fundraiser and enthusiastic volunteer. Cindy has participated with a tight-knit group of friends in the Avon 3-Day Walk and the Relay for Life events over the last several years. After her daughter, Lacey MaKenna, was stillborn on September 16, 2003, Cindy placed her focus on WalkAmerica. Her group of friends added an extra 17 people to the team, most of whom have no connection to SHARE Atlanta except for their love and support for Cindy and Lacey.

Marcia's note: Emily's family has been an active part of SHARE Atlanta since Polly first came to our grief support group in 1996. Joe and Polly designed and their landscaping business built "our" angel that Emily refers to in her poem.

This touching poem speaks to many of our parents' fear of how the death of their baby will influence their living or subsequent children. Emily was two when Polly and Joe experienced their first loss on November 1991. She was "there" for all of her siblings' deaths plus the limiting pregnancy that Polly experienced with their son, seven year old, Joseph. With all of these experiences, Emily is a wonderful young lady of 14. She is a joy to be around and, like so many of our special babies' siblings, very caring and responsive to the people and world that surrounds them.

Emily's poem was chosen to represent Peachtree Charter Middle School in the cultural arts contest, "Reflections," sponsored by the nationwide PTA. This year's theme was "I Am Happiest When." Her poem now will be included in a district wide contest. Emily, though, is the treasure here for her family and all she touches.

Looking ForWard

This fall marks the 20th anniversary of SHARE Atlanta, twenty years since that first meeting with Marcia and Larry [Connelly] and the only person to show up—a devastated father who left the new leaders anxiously wondering if they'd helped at all. As we look to the future and the hope for prevention of pregnancy loss and newborn deaths, we also take a moment to look back at the past and remember the amazing changes we've already witnessed.

As I prepared this newsletter, I went back through the old issues. The pages from the 1980s are stiff with glue and tape—back when "clip art" was a literal phrase. I remember a time when none of us had an email address, much less a website. I'm grateful for the resources of the present, and wonder if I'd get a single issue out the "old way"!

One thing that is exactly the same, though, is the love we have for our children and the bond we feel with other parents who have experienced this tragedy. The poem Larry wrote for his son's first birthday (opposite page) is filled with the same mix of pride and grief that the later writings show. I hope these bring you the feelings of connectedness that filled me as I read them. It reminds me that, though time passes, I am never alone.

On March 18, 1994 Kendall was born at 31 weeks gestation by emergency c/section because of fetal stress A and dips in his heart rate. He was small for a 31 weeker because there were not enough nutrients getting to his body. He only weighed 1 pound 15 ounces.

At first, we thought he was just a small premature baby and in time he would grow and would go home. But a week after he was born the Doctors found that his endotracheal tube would not go to the point where they wanted it to go. He was transferred to Egelston from Dekalb to undergo further testing. It was suspected that he had a narrowing of his trachea. Once he was there, he became unstable. The rest of his life became a constant battle to stablilize him. At one point, the neonatologist at Egleston (Dr. Reese Clark who was so absolutely wonderful) talked to us about making Kendall a "do not resuscitate". He said that it appeared that Kendall had this extreme narrowing and that his tiny body would not be able to sustain life.

It was a very difficult decision. I, his mother, am a nurse, and it was a great burden having the knowledge to realize what was going on and having to explain these things to the rest of the family. After discussion, we decided to make Kendall a "do not resuscitate". He lived for a few more days, and then morning his tiny body could no longer take it. He died at 11:07 that

morning. I remember watching his heart beat get slower and slower on the monitor until at last there was not another beat. I thought my life would never be the same.

I knew of SHARE Atlanta from being a nurse and working in labor and delivery and attended the meetings at DeKalb Hospital. Marcia was there. I so admired her. Here was a woman who had had losses and she seemed so....normal. The journey of grief seemed like a long road with a bridge near the end of the journey, and once I could cross over that bridge, I could be like Marcia. I didn't think it would ever happen. But in time, the pain became less sharp and my life started to resemble something of what I once deemed "normal." I realized one day that I was across that bridge. By realizing that Marcia had done it, I had gotten there myself.

Kendall would have been 10 now. There are still days that I consider "bad Kendall days". They are few and far between now. And I am thankful I had the opportunity to know Marcia at that time in my life. To all those parents who are still suffering the fresh sting of their loss, please know that it WILL get better one day.

Fetal Death Certificates: More Than "Just a Piece of Paper"

I miscarried my first child in Illinois. My husband and I had flown up there for a long weekend. We were blessed to be in a hospital that had a nurse who represented SHARE. Our son was 14.5 weeks gestation. His death and speculated that none were issued for was attributed to attaching near a growing fibroid. When we were told that miscarriage was inevitable, after days of hemorrhaging, I was given Cervodil, in order to deliver him. After he was delivered, I was given a D&C

to remove any remaining placenta.

Following the surgery, Stephen was brought in again for us to see. He was lying on a crocheted

blanket that was placed inside a baby Moses basket. The chaplain had placed a white cloth with a cross on it over his chest. I baptized his body, knowing his soul was already in Heaven. Sometime during all of this, a nurse completed his death certificate at my bedside. I never thought of it again until I received the certificate in the mail from the funeral home that had handled his burial.

When I lost my second child. I inquired about getting her death certificate. The hospital chaplain (Georgia) didn't know anything about getting a death certificate, miscarried babies. After many phone calls to the Medical Records department, as well as Vital Records, I learned otherwise. With my third child, I requested that a death certificate be placed with all of my pre-op

As awful as miscarriage is, my first loss "set the standard" for my future losses. Sadly, Stephen was the only child I saw, because the other three died very early. Since Stephen was treated with such dignity, I wanted the same for all of my children. Other than ultrasound pictures, I had nothing tangible that I could connect to my other three children's lives. The death certificates show that I am a mother, that these children were named, and that they existed for

a time inside me.

> information, so I could fill it out correctly before my D&C. When I finally received the certificate, it was as if no one had paid attention to the one I filled out-it was full of "unknowns" in blanks that I had filled out previously.

With my fourth child, my maiden name was misspelled, and my child's name was not on the certificate. I was able to get these mistakes corrected easily.

In Georgia, fetal death certificates are available for everyone who has ever conceived and then lost a child before birth unless they had an elective abortion. I have been told that Vital Records does not keep the fetal death certificate information on computer, but it is filed by the mother's maiden name. Do not be surprised to see the certificate filled out by hand rather than typed. Also, it takes several weeks to get the death certificate from the hospital to Vital Include a money order for \$10 for each certified copy. Here are Records. You can include your child's name in the death certificate; otherwise, there will just be an identification number in the blank where a name would usually be.

You should be aware that there are frequent mistakes in the certificates, mainly because those completing them will just put "unknown" rather than verify information. Most common mistakes include: demographic (address, county, etc.), misspelled mother/father/child names, putting "unknown" for sex, even when chromosome testing is done, putting "unknown" in the blank that concerns whether baby died before labor. All of these mistakes showed up on my last three fetal death certificates.

The good news is that all are correctable. If you need corrections made, you can call Vital Records at (404) 679-4701 and ask for Wilma Watson. She can guide you through the process that I have outlined. Some information can be corrected by you; other information, such as the baby's sex, has to be corrected by your physician writing a letter on physician's letterhead. (Have the

physician send this to you, then send it to Vital Records.) To obtain a copy of your child's fetal death certificate, write:

the facts to include in your letter of request:

- Mother's maiden name and social security number
- Father's name
- Date of loss
- Hospital where D&C performed or delivery occurred
- Doctor or midwife's name

All of the above may seem like a hassle but, for many of us, this certificate is a tangible validation of our child's brief life on earth. Please feel free to e-mail me via the link on SHARE Atlanta's website with questions about the above information.

(Note from Marcia: Recognizing our babies, in many different ways brings healing. It also helps those in our community learn how important all children are. We thank Laura for doing the research, remembering and honoring her children, and for sharing her thoughts and findings with us.)

great comfort. It allows her to "parent" her child that will always be the closest to her heart.

Valerie, in the project that Phillis Almgren carried for many years, continues this outreach to other children in memory of our babies. She has made beautiful mementos in honor of your baby that you will receive when you donate to the Foster Care Shelter. We will also light a virtual candle, online, when a donation is made, in memory of your child. You can find out more about our program online under "Outreach for Healing" in our Main Drop Down Box.

Here is Valerie's story...

"My due date was still more than two weeks away, when one of my neighbors came bouncing across the lawn with a beautiful package for the arrival to be. I remember wincing, with something in the back of my mind always nagging me, wondering if this baby would be ok. But, it was thoughtful and caring on the part of my neighbor and most of my family and friends had treated my pregnancy as a non-event, given that this was to be my third child.

The gift was very generous: a sweet little outfit with a matching bib, booties and blanket. Although the colors of the outfit were gender neutral, it somehow screamed out GIRL to me. I winced again (how I would love a girl, but I still have a sinking feeling about this pregnancy) My precious daughter, Megan, was stillborn three weeks after I opened the neighbor's gift. After losing her, there were many logistics to deal with, including what do I do with that gift? My neighbor did not want the gift back; she didn't know what to say or do regarding the gift. I couldn't return it. If it were returned, wouldn't that be acting as if my child did not exist? My child did exist! It was all terribly awkward.

There were many things which I clung to in desperation and held near to my heart after losing Megan, but this outfit somehow signified my anger and outrage. This cute little outfit was meant for a live, active, moving child - my child. Why wasn't my little girl here to wear it? Why was this so unfair? Would I ever have another baby to hold who could wear the outfit? Who knew. Would I even want a new baby to wear something destined for Megan? Probably not. Why, God, am I having to deal with any of this at all?

As I began my path of grief and became involved with SHARE Atlanta, I decided to donate the gift to another family who hopefully needed and wanted it. Somehow, that simple act brought me a lot of peace. I freed myself of the object which was just too poignant of a reminder to keep in my house. Perhaps in some small way I felt that Megan lived on because I had given something of hers to a living child - something of hers which was tangible, and meant for this earth even though she could not be here. Perhaps it was as simple as passing on the kindness my neighbor had extended to me, in hopes that someday my soul would again feel generous, kind-hearted, and alive."



The Compassionate Friends (a parent-led grief support group for those who have lost children of all ages) of Atlanta started creating "memory trees" a few years ago. They found much comfort in the actual process of gathering together and in preparing the tree ornaments and memorial booklet. With this project, they also make it clear for the 165,000 people who pass by their tree, that TCF's group exists for comforting parents who have lost their children and that these children will not be forgotten. You can see their trees and their memorial books online at: http://www.tcfatlanta.org/

SHARE Atlanta is trying to see if we have enough interest within our group to make a similar project happen for us. Using the theme "Forever in our hearts" we would collect heart shaped ornaments in memory of our babies. For those who contribute an ornament, we would include their baby's name and/or dates in our own "memorial" booklet and hopefully a handout so others will know that we will not forget these little ones. We will also include pictures of the tree and our children's names on our website.

We would need a few people who will keep up with the donations of ornaments, be able to set the tree up the first week in December, and put the booklet/ handouts together. The actual tree is donated by the festival organizers and is sold during the festival to raise money for the hospital's children's programs.
