the broken heart of others.

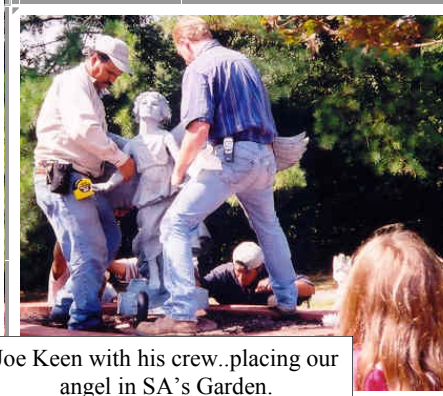
And then on a stormy October afternoon,

**On May 16, 2007, my son Aidan Grey Campbell** was born still at 22 weeks and 2 days. Quite simply, there is nothing worse than losing a child. Of course, along with the loss of your child, there is the loss of your dreams and hopes for that child.

After May 16<sup>th</sup> I knew that I would never be able to do all the things I had planned to do with Aidan. There would be no trips to the aquarium or to the zoo. I would never get to comfort him after he got hurt or kiss him goodnight. Never again could I hold him in my arms or tell him "I love you." *All the usual ways that mothers get to share their love and affection with their child were no longer avail-*

*able to me. Instead, I had to find other ways to show how much I love my son.*

The MODS' March for Babies was one wonderful way for me and my husband to show our friends and family just how important Aidan is to us. Our SA team was named "Team Aidan Campbell" to honor Aidan's memory. On our MODS' website, we were able to share Aidan's story. As the donations came pouring in, we found ourselves overwhelmed not only by the generosity shown, but also by the thoughtful responses we received.

When we walked with the other twelve members of Team Aidan, it was an uplifting experience seeing all of us in our matching t-shirts and knowing that we were all there because of how important Aidan was to us. I know Aidan was very proud of us that day. I think he was especially proud of his grandmother who walked the entire 5.2 miles even though she suffers permanent damage from a stroke. *And perhaps, even more rewarding is the thought that the money we raised to honor Aidan may prevent other families from having to suffer the same tremendous loss.*

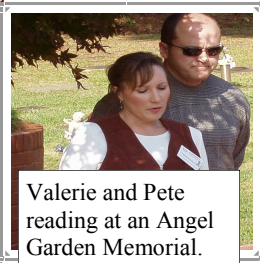
*If the bricks could talk, what amazing and timeless stories they would surely tell.*

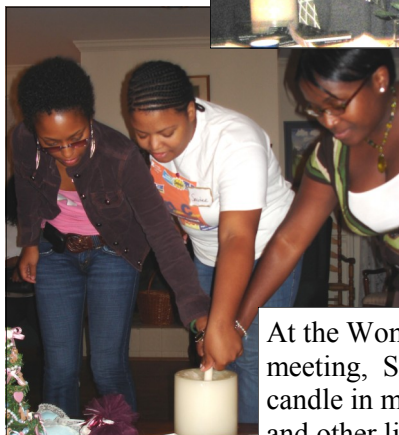

## *“Outreach for Healing” “Circle of Healing” Inservices*

SA presents 3 to 4 inservices a year. Our SA volunteers join me. Some have experienced a loss during the last 2 years...most are further down the path. Their clarity of expression and care to say what needs to be shared, all with compassion, creates a caring, learning environment for our audience..

Marcia McGinnis' "Circle of Healing" program covers: grief after a pregnancy or newborn loss; what the caregiver (person caring for patient/family) might say and do/not say and do that will support the family; and the role of the caregiver and of SA for healing. We distribute written materials that cover these topics as well as information about the CBRS and patient discharge support. We include two brief videos that focus on pregnancy loss.

During the program, SA parents share their thoughts, mementos, scrapbooks, etc. with the audience. We suggest helpful ways to make a difference for grieving families who have experienced miscarriages, stillbirths, and newborn death. We often have interaction between our audience and SA members. Our hope is to work together to help families begin to heal.

Our evaluations are consistently positive. Their comments include- I better understand: the grief process - what to say/do or not to say/do - how parents feel - how to help the family bond with their baby - the role I can play/SA can play in healing. Many say it is the first time that they feel less apprehensive about interacting with a grieving family.

## *Healing leads to New Understandings...*

### WHAT I HAVE LEARNED

Last July, 2004, my first born son would have been 20 years old.

Twenty years old!! I have to shake my head in disbelief. I cannot possibly be old enough to have a 20 year old child! Then again, I realize I am not the same person I was when he was born and I was 25. I'd like to think I have 20 more years of maturity under my belt. I'd like to believe I've learned a few things about life, and unfortunately, about death.

While I was putting my daughters to bed tonight, two daughters who would not be here had it not been for the deaths of their older brothers, I made an inventory of life's lessons in grief. *I realized that a lot of the important things I've learned about life I've learned since the deaths of my first two sons.* I've also learned so much from the many, many bereaved parents who came through the men and women's group that I led for 11 years.

I have learned that bad things do happen to good people.

I have learned that when it's YOUR baby and YOUR body, statistics don't matter.

I have learned that lightening can strike more than once in the same place.

I have learned that life is not fair and no one ever said it would be.

I have learned that even the best of friends can say the worst things.

I have learned that society gives us about 3 weeks to grieve.

I have learned that the stages of grief do not necessarily come in order.

I have learned that shock, denial, anger, sadness, despair and acceptance come and go for a long time.

I've learned that it's hard to be patient.

I have learned that religions don't necessarily help us grieve, but faith does.

I have learned that time doesn't heal all wounds, it's what you do with the time that makes the difference.

I have learned that even the best husbands cannot read minds.

I have learned that if men cannot fix it, they see no need to dwell on it.

I have learned the men's grief is often overlooked.

I have learned that talking can help, but there's nothing like talking to someone who's "been there."

I have learned that most of us are stronger and more resilient than we give ourselves credit for.

I have learned that anger is both normal and scary.

I have learned that although some aspects of grief are universal, we all grieve differently.

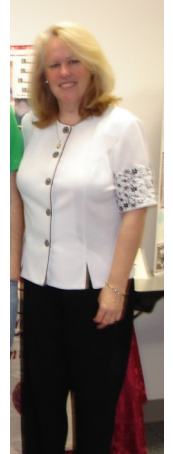
I have learned that we can complicate our grief by wasting time trying to make others know how we feel.

I have learned that some people will never understand the depth of our sadness.

I have learned that help, support and understanding can come from the most unexpected places and people.

I have learned that you never "get over" a loss, but incorporate it into who and what you become.

I have learned that there is no such thing as total "closure." The memory of our loss will always be there and it's OK to revisit it from time to time for the rest of our lives. Revisiting, in itself, can be healing.



Lynne designed our logo in 1994. She has devoted many hours of loving care to SA by wearing various "hats" in our organization. Besides leading the group, she headed up our phone committee, participated in our memorial services, was a co-president, and helped do whatever else needed to be accomplished. For over 10 years, Lynne has mailed our written materials to hospitals, etc. Lynne also joins us for SA services. Today, she and her husband, John, have 4 active children.
